Bhutan receives supply of essentials medicines from India

India's Ambassador to Bhutan, Ruhira Kamboj, handed over a consignment of medical supplies including the Hydroxychloroquine tablets that have proved to be useful in the clinical management and recovery of covid-19 pandemic to the health minister Dechen Wangmo last Monday.

According to the press release from the Indian Embassy in Thimphu the consignment was handed over in keeping with PM Modi's assistance that India would standby its close friend and neighbour, Bhutan in fighting the effects of the covid-19 pandemic.

over decades, states the press release.

In the letter sent last week, Lyonchhen said the generous medical assistance and facilitation of uninterrupted supply of goods into Bhutan despite lockdown in India was a true reflection of India's genuine friendship and care for Bhutan. Lyonchhen said the supplies, critical even during normal times, are invaluable in this hour of coronavirus. "Thank you for keeping your words," he said.

The leaders of the South Asian Association for Regional Corporation (SAARC) initiated by PM Modi held a video conference to chart out a collective strategy about COVID-19 on 15 March this year.

One of the strategies was India's proposal to establish a COVID-19 emergency fund through a voluntary contribution from the SAARC Member States

Initially India donated USD 10-million for the emergency fund followed by Sri Lanka with USD 5-million. Bhutan announced that it could contribute USD 100,000.
